Lamoriello to be inducted into U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame

Ex-Friar coach and A.D., now team president of the New Jersey Devils, will be joined by former NHL stars Mike Modano and Eddie Olczyk

Lou Lamoriello, the former Providence College player, coach and athletic director who has won three Stanley Cups with the New Jersey Devils, has been elected to the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame, USA Hockey announced on Wednesday.

Lamoriello, 69, will be inducted this fall, along with former NHL stars Mike Modano and Eddie Olczyk.

"It's an honor, especially going in with

these two players," Lamoriello told the Newark Star-Ledger.

"Eddie Olczyk I had in a sports festival when he was 16. I was a young coach then. And Mike Modano was on the 1996 World Cup team. That was a great series for American hockey," said Lamoriello.

"Unfortunately, one person gets recognized but it's really everybody in (the Devils') organization and it's people I spent a lot of time with at Providence College. It's really nice because it's a

culmination of both career, times and experiences. The only success you have is because of the people around you," he said.

"What a remarkable class. The positive impact this group has had on our sport is one that will be felt for decades to come," said Ron DeGregorio, president of USA Hockey.

A graduate of La Salle Academy in Providence, Lamoriello played on the hockey and baseball teams at PC. After graduating in 1963, he was hired as an assistant to hockey coach Zello Toppaz-

RED SOX

Finding a happy medium

As the July 31 trade deadline nears, the Sox must also make moves to balance their 25- and 40-man rosters

Any discussion about what deals the Red Sox might make at the July 31 trading deadline has to start with the state of their 40-man roster.

The return of a handful of players from the 60-day disabled list and the shadow of the Rule 5 draft in December mean that the Red Sox must keep roster considerations in mind as they maneuver through the month of July.

It's not as simple as buying or selling. Because the Red Sox face a logjam of players they'll need to put on their 40-man roster — starting with Jacoby Ellsbury, who could be activated from the disabled list as early as Friday — there's far more nuance to it than that.

In keeping with the no-man's-land in which they find themselves in the American League wildcard standings, the Red Sox figure to trade from redundancy and add to need. Fans looking for either a go-for-it blockbuster or a white-flag selloff are likely to be disappointed.

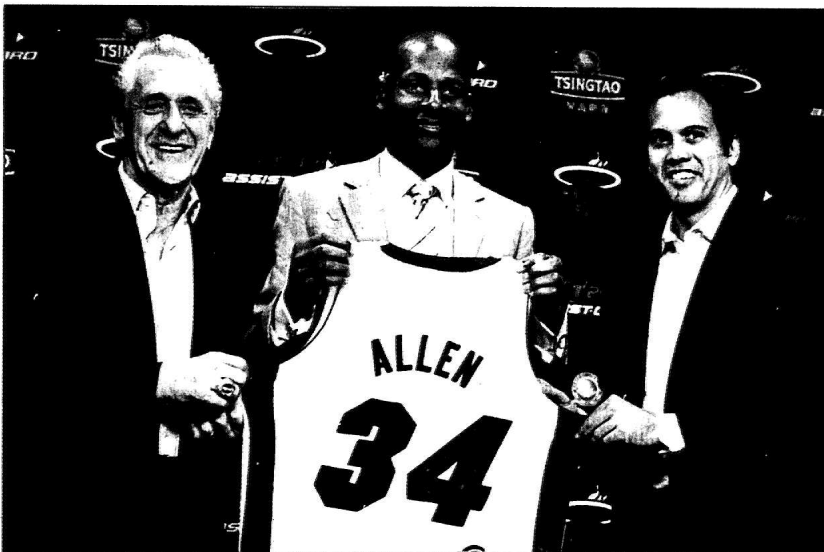
Even if the Red Sox were to tumble out of contention, it's far more likely that general manager Ben Cherington would sell off surplus parts — such as outfielder Ryan Sweeney, catcher Kelly Shoppach or relievers Matt Albers, Andrew Miller or Vicente Padilla — than make some sort of wholesale change. The onerous contracts populating the roster make more headline-grabbing trades almost impossible.

But it all starts with roster considerations. All teams have two rosters they have to manage. One is the 25-

MIAMI — Speaking for the first time as a member of the Miami Heat, Ray Allen told reporters on Wednesday that his problems with former teammate Rajon Rondo were not the reason he left Boston for Miami.

"I can't say that it factored in my decision," Allen said. "As teammates, we were brothers.

... There's differences. We all have differences. Paul eats Corn Flakes. I might not like Corn Flakes. That's just part of kind of who we are as individuals."

Allen also denied that the prospect of coming off the bench next season was a problem; in fact, he expressed no discomfort about the fact that his role in Miami is yet to be totally determined.

"Whatever's going to be best for me in this situation is going to figure itself out," Allen said, flanked by Heat president Pat Riley and coach Erik Spoelstra. "This team won a championship without me. I'm not going to come in

and expect for coach to cater to who I am and what I do. I've got to make that work on the floor with my new teammates."

So why did he go? Maybe because Allen did not feel that the Celtics did all they could to keep him wearing green.

While head coach Doc Rivers, president Danny Ainge and owner Wyc Grousbeck have all said that bringing Allen back for another season was a priority, Allen said that he did not necessarily feel like one.

"When Kevin [Garnett] signed, I was excit-

Back-to-back for Andrades

Twenty-nine years after his father defeated Paul Quigley, 18-year-old Cameron Andrade repeats the feat.

MIDDLETOWN — Twenty-nine years later, the result was the same.

On Wednesday members of two of Rhode Island's greatest golfing families went head-to-head in the R.I. Golf Association Amateur Championship and, as just as in 1983, the

Andrades beat the Quigleys.

Back in 1983 it was Billy Andrade, then a 19-year-old who played at Wake Forest, who turned back Paul Quigley, then a 38-year-old insurance man who was on his way to putting together the greatest amateur career in state history. It was the title match that year at Rhode Island Country Club.

On Wednesday afternoon, on the third straight magnificent day at Wampanoagony, the now 67-year-old Quigley was beaten by the

Another Andrade tops Paul Quigley

latest Andrade star, 18-year-old Cameron. Andrade started birdie-par-birdie to take a 3-up lead and never gave up control on the way to a 4-and-3 triumph.

Andrade will not get any rest. He will meet another of the state's greats, six-time player-of-the-year Charlie Blanchard, in Thursday's quarterfinals. Blanchard is one of two former champs still alive. The other is Potowomut's Bobby Leopold, the 2009 titlist.

Seamus Fennelly, who plays out of Foster and attends URI, earned the giant killer title for the week as he shocked defending champion and three-time winner Brad Valois, 1-up, in a wild morning match.

Fennelly built a 4-up lead through five. Valois then won five of the next eight to take a 1-up lead. The two were even through 16 before Fennelly won it with a deuce after hitting his tee shot on the par-3 17th within three feet. Fennelly then held off Joshua Walker, 2-up, in the second round.

Fellow collegians Jamison Randall, who is coming off an excellent freshman year at Old Dominion, and Notre Dame's Eddie Hjerpe also won twice, as did reinstated amateur Jonathan Drumm and Meadow Brook's Jason Barrow.

It will be difficult, if not impossible, for any match the rest of the week to be quite like the Quigley-Andrade contest. That truly was one for the ages — all ages. Andrade spoke about how that fact hit home for him on the first hole.

"We were walking down, and Mr. Quigley asked me how old I was," he said. "I told him 18. He said good, at least I'm not 50 years older than you. That's so unbelievable. And he's still so good."

Paul Quigley long since has become accustomed to taking on players of different generations, but this one was different.

"I lost to Billy in 1983 in the finals and now I'm playing his son. It's crazy," he said.

The day was made even more meaningful because the families know each other so well. And the families played a big part in the match. Cameron had his parents, Billy and Jody, with him. In fact, he put his father to work as his caddie, replacing his cousin, Justin Matrone, who had to work at Andrade's Seafood for the day. Cameron's grandparents, John and Helen Andrade, were at the course where they used to be members, following their grandson as they have each day.

Quigley had his family with him, too, including his wife, Geneva and daughter Sage. Three of his grandchildren also were there for "Papa," as they called him.

Quigley spoke about how competing against someone he has watched grow up made for different feelings.

"It is a little harder. We're so friendly," he said. "From where I am, you want him to do well. He's got his whole competitive career ahead of him. I'm just hanging out with super senior stuff. All these kids, you want to see all of them play well."

He saw Cameron Andrade do exactly that. Andrade swept to a 6-and-5 victory over Mike Douillette of Crestwood in the first round. He was 3-under and did not make a bogey. He again shot a 2-under 33 on the front against Quigley.

"The only holes I lost were when I hit it on someone's front lawn (on 10) and when he chipped in (on 13)," Andrade pointed out. "I was happy with the way I played."

"He's got his father's grip," Quigley said of Andrade. "Early on, Billy had that real strong grip and Cam's got it. He booms the ball. This morning we were a hole ahead of him. I'm on the eighth tee. He landed it in the middle of the seventh green. That's about 285 or 290 yards uphill. He flew it right on the green.

Other highlights on the day included strong play by the collegians who remain alive — Randall, Hjerpe and Fennelly. Drumm also had a day to remember when he eliminated the other Hall of Famer still alive, George Pirie, in the second round.

Pirie was playing six weeks after undergoing

heart surgery and he was still having some effects from the operation. He called his doctor after Tuesday's second round and was told to come in immediately for an EKG.

"They told me everything was fine," he said. The 62-year-old periodontist beat Mitch Pozez of Carnegie Abbey, 4 and 3, in the first round. But he fell 4-down to Drumm in the afternoon and, while he pulled within one hole, lost, 2 and 1.

A rising talent faces proven one

Final matchup pits college player Jamison Randall, previous champ Charlie Blanchard

MIDDLETOWN — It will be a college golf coach against a rising college star for the 107th R.I. Golf Association Amateur Championship.

Charlie Blanchard, the Bryant University coach and the dominant player in RIGA events for the past decade, won twice Thursday at Wamunetonomy to advance to Friday's 36-hole title match. His opponent will be the latest in the long line of outstanding young talent produced in the state, Alpine's Jamison Randall.

Randall, a Cumberland High grad who won the RIGA Juniors in 2010 and Interscholastic League title in 2011 before heading to Old Dominion University, looks to be a more than worthy foe for Blanchard, the RIGA's player-of-the-year in six of the last 10 seasons. Randall displayed awesome power as he won twice Thursday and in the process played the best golf seen all week.

While the competition was match play, Randall kept track of all his shots.

"It's impossible for me to not know what I'm shooting," he said. "I was minus-4 through 13 in the morning (when he overpowered Jason Barrow 7 and 5) and I was minus-4 in the afternoon."

Randall had too much for Bobby Leopold in the semis, eliminating the 2009 champion, 4 and 3.

"He played really well," Leopold said of the 19-year-old Randall. "He makes the course look like a pitch and putt. He can reach so many of the par-4s."

"It could always be better," Randall said. "I left a few putts on the edge. It could have been a lot better."

Randall, a rangy, athletic-looking 6-foot-2, 195-pounder, let everyone know what was in store quickly. The second hole is a 310-yard par-4 guarded by trees on the left. He flew his drive over the trees. It landed in front of the green, bounced on and nearly rolled in for an ace. It ended up about 12 feet behind the hole.

Randall, who had a strong freshman year at ODU, has come a long way from when he began learning the game at the Button Hole Short Course in Providence and even from winning the Interscholastic League and RIGA Junior crowns.

"I'm a much better player now, much more solid, much more consistent," he said. "My short game is a lot better, my putting, everything. I'm much more solid, by far."

"I thank a lot of people," Randall said. "Jeff Dantas, my instructor at 426 Fitness, the coaching staff at Old Dominion. I have to thank a whole lot of people. Their efforts, along

with a lot of hard work, have made me what I am."

Randall lost only two holes all day. After being 1-up through six against Barrow in the quarterfinals, Randall won 7, 8, 10, 11, 12 and 13 with birds on five of those holes. In the semis, he jumped to a 4-up lead through eight against Leopold. The only hole Leopold won was with a bird on 14.

"I was even-par for the match and lost 4-and-3," Leopold pointed out. Leopold is the assistant golf coach at Bryant. In the title match, Randall will move in against the head coach, Blanchard.

Blanchard used more grit and experience to put himself in the finals for the fourth time. He won in 2001 and lost in the finals in 2002 and 2007. The 46-year-old has been doing what he has needed to stay alive.

"I haven't played that great," he said. "This was the only match where I kind of hurt myself, made some bad bogeys."

He led Seamus Fennelly, the runner-up for the RIGL title to Randall last year, by three holes through 11. But while Fennelly ran off pars, Blanchard stumbled.

"I don't play that much and when I do I don't walk," Blanchard said. "I started running out of gas."

Fennelly caught Blanchard and forced extra holes. On the 19th, the par-4 first, Fennelly hit his approach into the left bunker. He faced a sliding, downhill shot without a lot of room.

"I hit a perfect shot," he said. The ball carried just out of the bunker and rolled within five feet.

"I had the same putt I had earlier against Charlie," Fennelly said. "I thought I made it." But the putt slid past, losing the hole and the match.

In the morning quarterfinals, Blanchard lost the first hole to Cameron Andrade, but came right back with a bird to win the second. He took the lead by winning the sixth hole and never trailed from there as he went on to a 3-and-1 decision.

Fennelly was 2-down to Eddie Hjerpe of RICC through 11. Fennelly won 12 and 13 with birdies to pull even, took the lead for the first time with a par to win 15, then closed it out with a par to win 18 and the match, 2 up. Leopold fell 3-down early against Valley's Jonathan Drumm. He surged back and twice took 1-up leads. Drumm pulled even again with a bird on 15. Leopold went back on top when he won 17 with a par and the two both parred the final hole for the 1-up decision for Leopold.
